The Rev. Dr. Jay Johnson will inaugurate adult education at Church of Our Saviour on March 9 following the 10am service, with a presentation on the Revelation to John. Lunch will be served. A \$5 donation is requested to cover the cost. Please RSVP to the office and let us know if you need childcare. Father Jay teaches theology at Pacific School of Religion and the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, two member schools of the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley. His first book was published in 2005 -- *Dancing with God: Anglican Christianity and the Practice of Hope*. He is a clergy associate at the Church of the Good Shepherd in Berkeley and also served occasionally as a supply priest and interim rector at Church of Our Saviour in the 1990s.

Father Jay will present [Apocalypse Now? How to Read the Biblical "Revelation to John."](#) What kind of sense can we make today of the last book, and what many people consider the strangest book of the

Bible? Is the "end" really near? Is Christ coming back soon? These are not new questions. The Revelation to John has always sparked wild speculation and intense controversy. In the fifth century, St.

Augustine had to argue that the fall of the Roman Empire did not signal the end of the world. In the sixteenth century Reformation, Martin Luther pushed for removing the Revelation of John from the Bible altogether. That strange book has also played a prominent role in American history, from the founding of this country to the present day. Jay Johnson will facilitate a discussion on this endlessly fascinating book and offer suggestions for how Christians can read it today for fresh insights into Christian hope and the Good News of the Gospel.

Who's in the Pews?

Positive Force

Joan Dedo (second alto from the left in the choir) is a fun person. Those were her red shoes and Valentine socks processing into church on February 10. That was Joan at Mardi Gras, festive in a green and gold sequined shirt. (The rhinestone necktie stayed home this year.) And Joan takes herself out hiking with a group of friends every Tuesday, rain or shine -- almost. Happily, this upbeat, lively person found her way into our congregation.

It was Feb. 12, 1957, that Joan made her first visit to California. She, along with other adventurous friends from the University of Michigan, was transporting a car from one dealership in Michigan to another in Hayward, California. Arriving in a winter that was warm, bright, and blossoming, the three realized they were not in Michigan anymore. "I was determined to stay," says Joan. Her friends were in solid agreement.

Within a week, all the girls, who had been staying at a women's hotel in San Francisco, had found jobs and a small apartment there to share. Joan started out at the phone company as a service representative. That training, she says, helped her get other jobs all her working life. But her dream job, the one she hadn't trained for, was the library. That would come later.

The following year, she married and began to produce sons. Doug, Bill and John all arrived within four years and in different locations. Once the family had resettled in San Francisco, Doug, Bill and John attended Cathedral School for Boys. Besides the school's fine academics, they were especially attracted by its choir.

But based as she was in San Francisco, Joan didn't discover Church of Our Saviour until much later. By 1980, they'd bought a house in Mill Valley with a rental unit. That was when she decided to have a look at the local church. Six years later, she moved into the unit, then into the house in 1991, where she still lives. When the place needed remodeling, architect and fellow parishioner Bill

Cullen helped draw up plans for the work.

In Mill Valley, Joan Dedo began to recapture old dreams. "Mill Valley is a healing place to be," she says, and one part of that process involved music. .

Those of us who hear our choir's polished renditions on Sunday don't see the friendly rumpus of Thursday choir practice. Says the alto, "There's always a belly laugh."

This combination of companionship and music was especially helpful and healing when Joan was struggling to resettle her aging parents in Ohio.

Here also she recaptured her old love of libraries by becoming a volunteer at the Mill Valley Library and joining Friends of the Library there. "Every room I've remodeled, I put in bookshelves," she admits.

And more recently, this singer and book lover has been joined by an old friend from the University of Michigan, Rom Portwood. Rom's fraternity was next door to the sorority where both Joan and Ron's late wife lived. In 1959, when the young Portwoods came out to attend law school in Berkeley, the two families started sharing activities. Their kids grew up more like cousins than friends. And now, after all these years, Joan and Rom enjoy quality social time together.

Joan Dedo has been on three pilgrimages so far, to southern England, northern England, and Scotland. Next year, she's looking forward to another one, this time in Wales. But for 2008, she'll stay closer to home, only traveling as far as Niagara, to the Shaw Festival.

Does this sound like fun? You bet.

The Senior Warden's Report

Many thanks to Paige MacLeod and Tom Dugan for spearheading the Bridge the Gap campaign. As is discussed elsewhere in more detail, the campaign was a huge success and has resulted in a balanced 2008 budget. The willingness of this parish to meet all challenges is a constant source of inspiration to me.

One of Father Richard's goals for this year is to get adult education up and running. Following our kick-off event featuring Father Jay Johnson on March 9, we will have two sessions on spiritual disciplines. The first session will be April 20 and will be led by our own Amy Gage. Amy is a certified and registered Yoga teacher at the highest level of qualification and has taught Yoga and meditation for 30 years. Our second session will be May 18, and details will be available shortly. Adult education will take a break over the summer and resume in October when we will have three sessions on the Anglican communion—past, present and future. Thank you to everyone who discussed their desires for adult education at the Annual Meeting and filled out the surveys. The information we received has been invaluable in planning. Thank you too to the adult ed committee—Valerie Robin, Marsha Dugan, Mark Tarpey-Schwed and Larry Snyder for their leadership.

Another goal for the year is to fix the drainage problem at church once and for all. Many of you may not know what a headache winter storms can be, with rising waters overwhelming our various sump pumps, not to mention the issues that arise when the electricity fails. The burden on the junior warden, sexton, church members who live near by (thank you Earl Johnson!), the rector and our tenant is immense. Our junior warden, ably assisted by Bill Cullen, Charles Redfield, Terry Peck and Tom Ferrin, has devised a comprehensive strategy for resolving all water issues at church. Steve will be seeking bids on the largest part of the work—running drainage pipes to Throckmorton Avenue—over the next few weeks. Our goal is to have this work done by May 1st. Many thanks to Steve and his team.
